**INTERSEGMENTAL GENERAL EDUCATION TRANSFER CURRICULUM (IGETC)**

<b>M</b>	<b>IP</b>	<b>N</b>	<p>Completion and certification of IGETC will permit a student to transfer from Copper Mountain College to a campus in the UC or CSU system without the need, after transfer, to take additional lower-division general education courses. <b>All courses must be completed with a grade of “C” or better.</b></p> <p><b>CERTIFICATION:</b> Current IGETC standards allow for full or partial certification. Partial certification is defined as completing all but two courses from any area except those listed in Areas 1 and 2. In the final term before transfer students should request IGETC certification with Admissions &amp; Records when requesting their final transcripts to be sent to the UC or CSU campus of their choice.</p> <p><b>CAUTION: IGETC may not be the best option for transfer, particularly for majors such as Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Computer Science, Engineering, and Math.
